What is Research?

 Research is defined as the creation of new knowledge or the use of existing knowledge in a new and creative way to generate new concepts, methodologies, and understandings.



What is a Research Paper?

- A research paper is a piece of academic writing that provides analysis, interpretation, and argument based on in-depth independent research.
- It is typically longer and more detailed than an essay, designed to assess scholarly research skills.



Steps in Writing a Research Paper

1. KNOW the focus of your paper (What? Why? When?).

Components:	- Title	- Abstract	- Introduction
- Literature Review	- Methodology	- Experimental Setup	- Data Collection
- Data Analysis	- Result	- Discussion	- Conclusion

Title

- A good title summarizes the main idea(s) of your study in the fewest words possible.
- It adequately describes the content and purpose of your research paper.



Abstract

- The abstract introduces the reader to the aims, methodology, and findings of the study.
- It typically contains a 150- to 250-word paragraph.



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Introduction

- States the overall purpose and defines the research question(s).
- Provides a brief background of relevant theory and practice.





Literature Review

 Summarizes conclusions from past research and highlights main issues and controversies around the topic.



Methodology

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• Explains research methods and justifies data collection and analysis procedures.

Experimental Setup

 Describes how the experiment was conducted, including instruments used and procedures followed.



Data Collection

- Includes the dates of data collection, often in tabular form.
- Can be combined with the Experimental Setup for shorter papers.



Data Analysis

 Analyzes the data based on theories developed in the introduction.



Results



Presents findings in an organized manner, using headers that align with patterns identified in research.





Discussion

Comments on trends/findings and discusses any unexpected results.

Conclusion







Summarizes findings and discusses the significance and limitations of the study.

Suggests areas for future research.



Acknowledgments

• Expresses gratitude to those who contributed to the research.

References



• Lists all reference materials cited in the report, organized alphabetically.

Appendix



 Provides supporting information not included in the main text, such as additional data, diagrams, or tables.



• 5. Be ORIGINAL and avoid PLAGIARISM.

Plagiarism



- Plagiarism is presenting someone else's language, thoughts, or ideas as one's own.
- Avoid by quoting, summarizing, and paraphrasing with proper citations.

What is a Thesis?

 A thesis is a research paper based on original research, typically submitted at the end of a master's program or as a bachelor's capstone project.



Thesis Writing Process

 Title, Author, Abstract, Keywords, Introduction, Literature Review, Methodology, Experimental Setup, Result, Discussion, Conclusion & Future Work, Reference List, and List of Figures.

Difference Between Research Paper

- Research Paper:
- Provides analysis, interpretation, and argument.
- Thesis:
- Longer and usually the final project for a degree.
- - Often requires academic supervision.
